TAMIL NADU

- **T.N. Language Atlas: 96 languages spoken in State as per 2011 Census**
- ✓ Amidst Tamil remaining a strong marker of regional identity, the linguistic profile of Tamil Nadu reveals a vibrant variety of languages, including Telugu, Kannada, Urdu, Malayalam, and English, reflecting the State's rich linguistic diversity.



- ✓ According to the Language Atlas, the State had a total population of 7,21,47,030.
- ✓ Of this, 7,20,98,315 people (99.93%) reported speaking one of the 22 languages listed in the Eighth Schedule of the Constitution of India, while only 48,715 people (0.07%) spoke other languages.
- ✓ A total of 96 languages were identified within the administrative boundaries of Tamil Nadu during the 2011 Census.

- **Nasha Mukta Yuva For Viksit Bharat**
- ✓ Central government has launched a nationwide youth-led national movement, 'Nasha Mukta Yuva for Viksit Bharat.



- ✓ The initiative was launched at the recently concluded Youth Spiritual Summit in Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh.
- ✓ The Youth Spiritual Summit adopted a 'Kashi Declaration' that outlined a series of initiatives to be undertaken to lay the foundation for a national youth-led anti-drug campaign in the country.
- ✓ The theme of the Youth Spiritual Summit was- Drug-Free Youth for a Viksit Bharat.

IMPORTANT DAYS

➤ **National Mango Day – July 22**

- ✓ National Mango Day is observed on 22nd July each year in India.



- ✓ Celebrates the mango, India's national fruit and widely called the "king of fruits".
- ✓ Mango is seasonal, available mainly in summer.
- ✓ India is the world's largest producer and exporter of mangoes.
- ✓ Mango has been cultivated in India for over 4,000 years.

➤ **National Broadcasting Day – July 23**

- ✓ National Broadcasting Day 2025, celebrated on July 23, marks the legacy and evolution of radio broadcasting in India, beginning with the Indian Broadcasting Company (IBC) in 1927.



- ✓ It commemorates milestones from the first radio transmission in 1923 by the Radio Club of Bombay to the transformation into All India Radio (AIR) and later Akashvani.
- ✓ AIR, with 591 stations in 23 languages and 146 dialects, has played a crucial role in public communication.
